

## SIMPLY EAT REVD JOHN COYNE

Several years ago, I was given a beautifully illustrated book entitled Simply Eat. Its vision is both simple and profound – to celebrate the delights of friendship,

food and faith through a shared meal together. As someone who needs little enticement to enjoy food (!) I was instantly hooked on the idea that food shared with others can deepen community and friendship. Since we moved here I have enjoyed a night out with Burton blokes, a neighbourhood barbecue, meals in our home, as well as in the homes of people I had only recently met. Puddington's village green has been the venue for a feast; we have sampled restaurants and coffee shops with others, and each occasion has been a delight and taken a friendship or

food has deep symbolism.

relationship to a richer level.

The gift of eating with others
- tasting, savouring and
smelling our meal - can build
and celebrate community.
Jesus often spoke of God's
best, the future He invites us



into, in terms of joining in a banquet or feast. Eating together helps build relationships and strengthen community. Jesus spoke of Himself as the 'bread of life' (John, Ch. 6), that is, as the one who feeds and satisfies the deepest hungers in the human heart.

So here is a suggestion to do something extra for the well-being of our local communities: let's become intentional about inviting others to share a meal with us. We can eat together in public spaces or in homes, in restaurants, in coffee shops or have a picnic in a field – but food will not be the goal of the encounter, rather, we'll be sharing food to build bonds of friendship across age groups, across post codes, across interest groups. As a result, we trust that living in our neighbourhood will become more fun, more inclusive and more enriching. I meet people who are so busy ... yet the chance to sit down with them over a slow meal



and a drink changes the pace, opens up the conversation and builds bridges to friendship, interest and support.

I come across other people who see no one from one day to the next - yet a

shared meal, a piece of cake or an invitation to come to tea could light up their lives. You might remember in the past when neighbours planned 'safari suppers' and moved from house to house, enjoying a course in each home



before moving on. They were always fun.

My primary reason for talking about Simply Eat is a longing that, whilst being privileged to live in our local villages, we do all we can to strengthen our community life. Sue and I know that we want to develop the delights of inviting others we may not yet know well to share a meal with us. The impact of lots of people reaching out in this way might just be transformative, giving us all wonderful experiences to share.

## **HUNGER IN THE UK**

It's April at the foodbank. The (slightly) warmer weather is a boon, but demand is still high for fuel vouchers. Although inflation is lower prices are still rising and food and housing costs still much higher than a year or two ago (as you'll have noticed). Falling energy costs help though (negative inflation – hooray!). Consequently the

demand for the Foodbank's services is still high and food donations have been hit.

Food donations can be made at many supermarkets. The Wirral

Food banks facing toughest period in a decade as donations drop by up to 45 per cent but demand keeps rising

Foodbank is looking for custard, pasta sauce, tinned potatoes, tinned meat and tinned fruit, while the West Cheshire Foodbank is looking for instant mash, UHT juice, tinned fruit, tinned meat/meat meals and toiletries (deodorants). Both foodbanks also accept monetary donations which they use to bulk buy food as needed and to provide other services to foodbank clients. Regular donations especially help with financial planning.

The value that your donations bring is often expressed by clients. Most are amazed that it's donations that provide the food that they receive, and it's not uncommon for it to be described as a life saver for people who can otherwise not see how they would cope. Heartbreaking enough to hear from a single adult, but about 30% of food goes to children.

Wirral's Foodbank Plus service that provides help from Citizen's Advice Bureau agents serves about a third of all clients (that's about 200 people a month). The help ranges from assistance to claim support that a client's entitled to (which may just mean help with the forms), to advocacy to help write off debt, devise do-able repayment plans and appeal entitlement decisions. That's what they do, but the effect on their clients' lives is qualitatively different.

To volunteer or donate just Click

A client 'L', who suffers from congenital heart disease and has had an internal defibrillator since childhood which limits their activities, is bringing up their 9-year-old. A year ago 'L' was struggling with a wide variety of problems – debts amassed on council tax, energy and housing. They were in despair – grateful for food, but still

unable to see any light at the end of the tunnel. It's been quite a journey with Foodbank Plus, but today 'L' feels

positive – their debt is manageable and has gone down dramatically. It's the difference in L's outlook on life that is the real result from their work with Foodbank Plus and is tremendous and joyous to see.

As always, thank you for caring enough to help provide this support for our neighbours. It is greatly needed and appreciated by the foodbank's clients, volunteers and staff.

## A Village Tragedy in Puddington 1888

(From an account published circa 2010)

According to some reports, in March 1888 the weather had been ferocious. Two foot of snow fell in parts of England in the month of March. On this day, events unfolded which were to have a profound effect on the entire community.

The Day family lived in the gamekeeper's cottage on Puddington Lane, Puddington on the Wirral Peninsula. George was the gamekeeper in the nearby Burton Manor Estate. The previous year the family had sadly lost their eldest daughter to what today would be just a normal childhood illness.

Like all boys the younger sons George and William were attracted to the local pond where ice had probably been prevalent for several weeks. The temperatures had been sub-zero but there had been frequent snowfalls during the previous days. As George ventured out onto the pond's slippery surface he went through the ice into the freezing black water. As William tried to reach out for him he too found himself in the same terrifying cold waters of the pond.

In a nearby field the Day family's older sons Charles and John Edmund had heard the two youngsters' fearful cries for help. They rushed to the pond to attempt a desperate heroic rescue.

Alas, the rescue attempt was to end in a catastrophic failure.

The feeling of sadness of this terrible event spread swiftly through the local villages. By money raised totally by public subscription a memorial stone was erected. The grave and memorial stone is situated in the graveyard of St Nicholas' Parish Church, Burton, Wirral. Two trees were planted behind the Angels who looked over the brothers' grave and as the years went by the trees entwined around each other as they grew high, reaching out towards the heavens.

The Days had one other child, their daughter Clara born only two years before this tragic story took place. She became known as Nanny to her four grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

As the children grew up they heard many stories from both Nanny and Granddad. It was not until the grandchildren were nearing adulthood that this story was tentatively revealed to them. Even at her tender age Clara still remembered vividly the sad day that her brothers' bodies were laid side by side on the cold kitchen floor. Nanny died in her hundredth year.

After 125 year the memorial stone is now very weather worn, but with careful study the inscription can be deciphered.

It reads as follows: >>>

THE MEMORIAL STONE WAS ERECTED
BY PUBLIC SUBSCRIPTION
AS A TOKEN OF DEEP SYMPATHY WITH
GEORGE AND MARY DAY
OF PUDDINGTON
THROUGH THE SUDDEN
AND PAINFUL BEREAVEMENT
IN THE DEATH OF THEIR
FOUR SONS BY DROWNING
IN A POND NEAR THEIR HOME
ON 4<sup>TH</sup> MARCH 1888

# Down the Garden Path with Flori Bunda

## Spring, Spring, Spring!

Normally a beautiful season but not so this year with all the rain and gales.

The daffodils were beautiful, muscari and now bluebells to complete the picture. However, the camellias deserve a mention, pink, dark pink, white, cream and crimson, their blooms filled many vases.



Having enjoyed the wonderful mountains, waterfalls and wildflowers of Scotland, returning to the garden was actually a pleasant surprise. Tulips were still in flower, lilacs first coming into flower, and rhododendron well in bud. Some sweet pea seedlings are growing on well thanks to the attention of a neighbour in our absence.

Gladioli, candy bar, and gladioli mixture have been planted in trays to grow on, after which, to be planted in the ground, if it ever dries!



Flower seeds, annuals mix, scabiosa summer sundae, cosmos brightness mix, and larkspur are all in trays in the greenhouse. When



they are, hopefully, ready to be 'pricked out', the usual cry will be – no room in the greenhouse!

Green/gold finches, robins, blackbirds, a woodpecker, nuthatch, and occasionally Jenny Wren, are frequent visitors to the garden.

## Burton Mere Wetlands

Despite the unsettled weather we are still having, the reserve is now exploding with life! The weather is finally feeling a bit more like Spring with a nice fresh breeze but wonderful sunshine.

The Little Egrets are doing their fantastic bubbling calls up in the heronry. Cattle Egret have been seen in the heronry roost regularly, but less so on the reserve. Grey Herons will no doubt have chicks by now as they are always the first to start nesting.

The warden team have been super busy and initially had some slight delays due to the weather and extraordinary high tides, but with a great team of volunteers and now three fantastic residential volunteers Miles, Kinga and Al, they are getting back on track for the breeding season. Point of Ayr has had a right battering after the incredibly high tides. Fencing has now started to be installed and there have been 50 Little Terns spotted recently, fingers crossed for a good year.

Which brings me to our very exciting news of our first Lapwing chick of the season. Avocets are sitting on nests now and the count for them is over 120 individuals.

Marsh Harrier are in full swing with nesting onsite and are seen regularly food passing over the reedbed. We had a great couple of weeks of steady reports of Grasshopper Warbler being heard and seen occasionally both ends of the reserve.

A real rarity that turned up 19 April were four Common Cranes! A first for the reserve, landing for a few minutes giving those lucky enough to be in the Visitor Centre a fantastic view at the back of the main scrape area.




